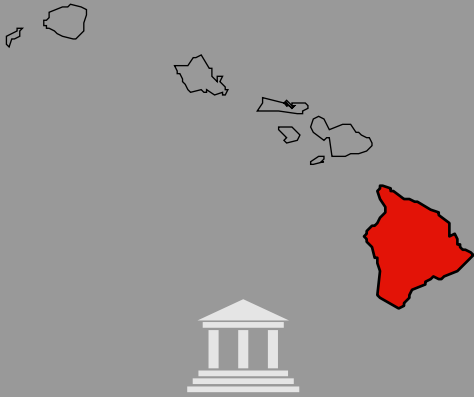

Qualifying Events

Hawaii indicated that seismic activity began on May 1, 2018. A series of earthquakes and aftershocks followed, causing the Kilauea Volcano to erupt. At the time of the application submission, 24 active fissures had forced the evacuation of three surrounding communities. Additionally, the lava flow covering 3.7 square miles had destroyed at least 600 structures and two state highways.



Proposal Summary

The Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations submitted an application requesting \$3,500,000 in Disaster Recovery National Dislocated Worker Grant (DWG) funding. The purpose of the project is to create disaster relief employment for eligible individuals to assist with clean-up and recovery efforts resulting from multiple earthquakes and volcanic eruptions in the southeast portion of the Island of Hawaii (Hawaii County).



Project Description

This project will create disaster relief employment for eligible individuals to assist in clean-up and recovery efforts related to a series of earthquakes and aftershocks that caused volcanic eruptions, beginning May 1, 2018 and continuing.
